What is Professional Development?

- A systematic process that strengthens how professionals obtain and retain knowledge, skills and attitudes.
- Consciously designed to actively engage learners and includes the planning, design, promotion (marketing), delivery, evaluation, and follow-up of professional development offerings (events, information sessions, and technical assistance).

- Establish a data management system

The Professional Development Practices: Follow-up


Provide Follow-Up Support

- Follow-up support (FUS) plan, including implementation strategies
- Plan FUS from the beginning
- Share expectations for follow-up during the event
- Schedule and implement as appropriate
- Collect participant and evaluation data

The Professional Development Practices: Follow-up

Building a Strategy

- Follow-up Support Plan
- Event Action Plan
- Engagement Plan



The Professional Development Practices: Evaluate

Evaluate Professional Development Processes

- Follow-up support (FUS) plan, including implementation strategies
- Collect participant and evaluation data
- Brainstorm evaluation questions
 about overall program
- Sort evaluation questions into categories or groups




